
# ACCA Advanced Performance Management Online Classroom Study Guidance

#### Welcome

Welcome to your ACCA Advanced Performance Management (APM) Online Classroom course.

The purpose of this document is to guide you through the different stages of your studies to prepare you for your forthcoming exam. We suggest splitting your study into three phases so that you can develop the knowledge and skills required to pass in the most efficient manner.



#### 1 – Taught Phase

The emphasis of this first stage is studying the syllabus and gaining the knowledge required to attempt exam questions. During this stage you will work through each chapter of the Strategic APM Workbook and steps 1-6 of the Achievement Ladder (which are in steps 1-6 on the Hub).

#### 2 – Revision Phase

During this stage the emphasis is on practising exam-standard questions to learn how to apply your knowledge and develop your exam. During this phase you will attempt Step 7 of the Achievement Ladder (in Step 7 on the Hub).

#### 3 – Final Preparation Phase


The aim here is to bring all of your skills and knowledge together in a final mock exam: Step 8 of the Achievement Ladder (on Step 8 of the Hub).

The Hub contains all the information, documents and videos for your course. The different phases of your course are clearly identified in different topic tiles so you can easily find them. Before you begin the Taught Phase, please take some time looking at the information provided in the **Getting Started** section on the Hub, in particular:

- Watch the Introduction to Advanced Performance Management and review the guidance in the Introduction section.
- An especially important document is the **Practice and Apply (P&A) guidance** pdf. This directs your question practice and gives some guidance on the questions that are made available to you at the end of Steps 1-5. The **P&A question practice** is built into the taught phase to ensure you are building your skills and exam technique throughout the course. These questions have been specially selected by BPP's subject experts to ensure that you are as prepared as possible for your exam. Many of these questions are real exam questions, to ensure that you are familiar with the standard of real exam questions by the time you reach the revision phase of your studies.
- Review the Assumed Knowledge course, especially if you were exempt from the Performance Management paper or if you passed that exam a while ago.



## 1 – Taught Phase



This guidance will take you through the Taught Phase of your course.

The emphasis of the Taught Phase is on gaining the knowledge and beginning to develop the skills in order to attempt exam questions.

During this Phase you will work through the APM Workbook, using the online lectures to guide you.

You will also work through Steps 1-6 of the Achievement Ladder. In each step, when you have covered all the topics in that part, you should attempt the relevant Achievement Ladder Step, as shown in this guidance.



#### Taught Phase - Step 1

Approximately **14 hours of study**\*.

\*The timings given are approximate and include time to stop and review online lectures and to check your answers for any question practice. You may find that some study sessions take you more or less time than given here. Remember there is no such thing as a 'typical' student so these approximations are for guidance only.

In this chapter you will look at how the management accountant can help to provide information that helps to contribute to the achievement of an organisation's strategy. Important features of the <b>strategic management accountant's</b> role in modern performance management such as SWOT analysis, <b>benchmarking, environmental analysis and portfolio analysis</b> ( <b>BCG</b> ) all feature here. The theme of strategic management accounting has had an important influence in the emergence of <b>integrated reporting which is covered later</b> . Strategic models that you will have seen before, such as the <b>BCG matrix</b> and <b>Porters' 5 forces</b> , are revisited although with more emphasis on performance management than you will have seen in P3 / SBL.

This topic recaps on basic concepts of budgetary control, but mainly focusses on creating a hierarchy of controls that ultimately contribute to the achievement of an organisation's strategic goals. This is a key theme in APM.

It is important to understand the limitations of budgetary control techniques and that they will not always be appropriate.

There is also an increased importance in managing aspects of a value chain to support an organisation's core generic strategies.	
This change has affected what information we provide, which subjects we report on and, of course, how we provide the information.

<ul> <li>Key areas</li> <li>Performance management information systems</li> <li>Learn information.</li> <li>Big data &amp; Artificial Intelligence (AI).</li> <li>Reporting.</li> </ul> This very important chapter gets you to think about HOW an organisation's information needs should be satisfied. Remember that a system does not necessarily involve computers, so here we are talking about the human interface – the people aspect like acceptability and user-friendliness – as well as the need for efficiency in information provision. This is not a technical IT exam – but you do need to be aware of the characteristics of information systems and of useful information. You need to be able to confidently apply the general principle of 'lean information' to practical scenarios in the exam. In order to do this you need to thoroughly understand these concepts and be able to apply the 5S's. A good understanding of the benefits and drawbacks of the concepts covered here (especially big data and AI) is also important.

This topic starts to cover strategic performance measurement, which is section D of the syllabus. This syllabus area is a large chunk of the syllabus and is covered in chapters 7-12; it often features as a main focus of the 50-mark question in the exam.	
Much of this chapter may be familiar from earlier studies, but do not rush it as the themes (especially the discussion of the pros and cons of the different techniques) are very important in APM.

Aims and approaches to transfer pricing.	
This chapter focusses on challenges to performance management faced by larger organisations that are divisionalised. It is clearly important that senior corporate managers are in a position to assess and manage the performance of the various divisions that make up the organisation.	
<b>ROI, RI (introduced in the previous chapter) and EVA</b> have been tested frequently in the real exam, so carefully review these sections.	
<b>Transfer pricing is another commonly tested area</b> and it is <b>often an area</b> <b>that students struggle with at first.</b> As ever the ability to discuss this topic is more important than the numerical analysis.

sections of the workbook, paying specific attention applying your knowledge to the activity.

This is a short chapter and will not take long. It is mainly important because it helps to set up many of the remaining chapters, which are dominated by the use of non-financial performance measures (and remember NFIs are an important feature of SMA). This is partly because financial performance indicators often focus on historical or short-term performance.

In this chapter we look at human resources as a key tool in the achievement of strategy. The theories of <b>Fitzgerald &amp; Moon</b> and <b>Hopwood</b> are important and need to be learnt, but as ever it is your ability to apply the theory that really matters.

<ul> <li>Key areas</li> <li>Balanced scorecard.</li> <li>Performance pyramid.</li> <li>Building block model (Fitzgerald &amp; Moon).</li> <li>Activity based management.</li> <li>Value based management.</li> </ul>	
This chapter moves into section E of the syllabus (which is also covered in chapters 14 and 15). One of the section B 25-mark questions will come from this section of the syllabus, so the theories in this chapter are <b>extremely important</b> to study and practice applying.	
The examiner is very interested in some of these ideas and they feature in the APM exam on a regular basis.	
You will revisit activity based management which is likely to be familiar to you from the PM exam but the syllabus also includes the performance pyramid which highlights linkages between various aspects of performance management. Fitzgerald and Moon's building blocks are similar to the balanced scorecard but focus on the provision of service.	
Again, remember that <b>you are not expected to accept these models</b> <b>uncritically</b> , and the examiner will reward intelligent criticism of any of the models where appropriate.	
Activity based management and value based management are also important, and it is important that can explain these approaches. Value-based management (VBM) is often neglected - please do not make the mistake of doing this, VBM is a fundamental concept in performance management.

In this chapter you will look at the difficulties that organisations can experience. In particular we will see important indicators that can be used to predict corporate failure. If such predictions can be made in good time and generally sound controls are in place then corporate failure may be avoided.	
This chapter breaks into 3 sections – initially talking about causes of failure, then onto models to predict failure before then looking at ways to prevent failure occurring.	
Read through the contents of the two prediction models. You will not need to remember the formula but it is essential to appreciate the factors that Altman determined as predictors of failure.	
Exam questions have expected a thorough knowledge of the purpose and limitations of these models.


### Taught Phase - Step 6

To complete the Taught Phase of your learning, you should now attempt <b>Step 6</b> of the <b>Achievement Ladder</b> .	
Step 6 contains 3 questions, covering the whole syllabus.	
This Step is submitted for marking by BPP. You should tackle the questions to time. Once you have attempted them, you should work through the suggested solutions. You will both reinforce and extend your understanding of the syllabus content if you do this. When you receive your feedback you should review it carefully and note what you did well (do more of this!) and which areas you need to improve on in your ongoing studies.

## 2 – Revision Phase: Step 7



This phase is all about taking the knowledge you gained in the taught phase and applying it to exam-standard questions. The emphasis here is very much on exam technique.

#### Exam technique

Each Skills Checkpoint in the Workbook covers the Specific APM Skills and Exam Success Skills you need to pass. Working through the Skills Checkpoints using the online lectures for each Checkpoint will help you to develop your exam technique.

#### **Question practice**

The most effective way of improving exam technique is through question practice. Before moving on to the Revision Phase, we recommend you start by ensuring you have attempted Steps 1 to 6 of the Achievement Ladder as well as the questions recommended earlier from the Practice and Apply questions set in Steps 1-5.

The Step 7 Revision Phase tile contains short knowledge summaries for each chapter of the Workbook if you want a quick reminder of the key points. Once you have done that, you should attempt **Achievement Ladder Step 7** and complete all questions included in the revision phase of the **Practice and Apply Question Practice** document which are provided in the **Step 8 Revision Phase tile** on the Hub.

Achievement Ladder Step 7	4.5 hours
Step 7 is mock exam in the style of the real exam. This step will give you a feel for the balance of question types and syllabus coverage you can expect in your real APM exam.	
You should ensure that you set aside 3.25 hours, in a quiet space, where you will not be interrupted. Aim to complete the exam without using any of your notes, so that it is a real test of how prepared you are.	
One you have finished the exam you should carry out a self-review of your answers. There is a full online debrief, prepared to assist you with both the approach and the technical content.

Did you allocate your time appropriately?

•	Did you struggle to remember proformas or concepts from the standards? If so you need to review your key knowledge.	
•	Did you find it difficult to read or follow your workings when you reviewed it? (If you can give it to someone else to look at and see if they can read and follow what you did).	
•	For written questions did you tailor a specific answer to the question asked?	
•	Think about what you'd do differently if you sat the paper again.	
•	Estimated timings : attempting Step 7 : 3.25 hours, reviewing feedback carefully : 1.5 hours	


**Further Question Practice (FQP)**

## 3 – Final Preparation Phase: Step 8
